Town Heritage Planner Info

Barn at 145 Burnhamthorpe Road West

This used to be on the same property as 185 Burnhamthorpe Road West, (Featherstones) which is listed on the Heritage Register. The barn is pretty unstable and there are concerns with ongoing vandalism. We are working with, the owners, to do something similar to what we did with the Kaitting House. That is, to salvage stone and timbers to construct a new structure, such as a shade structure or pavilion, in a new park in North Oakville.

Barn at 3075 Trafalgar Road

This is at the NE corner of Trafalgar Road and Dundas Street. The barn itself is not actually original to the property, and was likely constructed in the 1930s. There are no large timbers or barn boards in the building – the frame construction is fairly modern and the cladding is all sheets of metal. At this time, it does not look like staff will recommend designation of the barn. However, there is one older section of lake stone on the one end of the foundation walls, and we'd like to see this material made available for salvage. This would be a condition of approval of the demolition.

Brickworks Bronte Creek Valley

Contribution from Tom Murison:

I found the site of an early brick kiln in Bronte Provincial Park yesterday.

The kiln was operated by Thomas Willoughby, before 1861. He was described as a brickmaker and mason. The red clay bank that the material was quarried from, various depressions that were pits for softening and mixing the clay and one large special brick that was probably used to build the "beehive" kiln were visible during my visit. Brick from here was used to build the Ralph Breckon House on Lot 33 in the park. It is possible that other brick from here were used within a few miles, possibly in Bronte and Palermo. I also suspect that Willoughby was using slash and offcuts from the sawmill across the creek as fuel for his kiln. He may have been making 50,000 or more brick a year which would be enough to build a large house, or a one room school. The bricks in the house (I am narrowing it down to around 1861) have a shallow irregular "frog" typical of early brick that were hand moulded.

Silo at Sheridan

We were contacted by one of our members about concerns regarding the Sheridan Silo and we contacted the Town on their behalf....Directly in front of Tim Horton's at the corner of Winston Churchill and QEW, is the landmark yellow silo. This and the stone cairn are the only two visual reminders of the community of Sheridan. A piece of unpainted plywood has been slapped over the opening to the silo, and an open electrical box is mounted on the side of it. I don't know if the electrical box is live or not, but it could be a hazard if it is. The

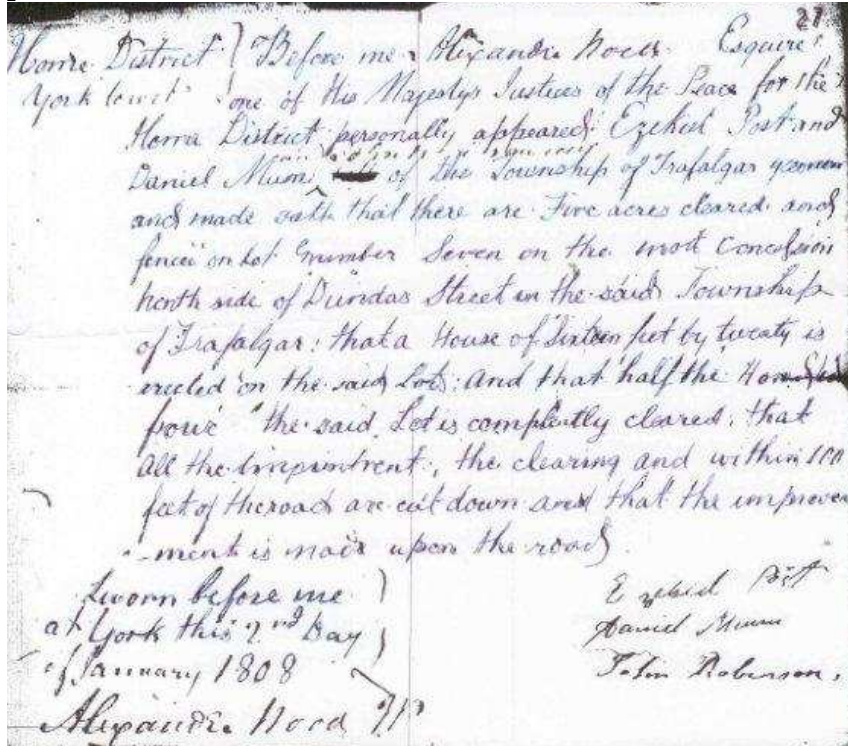
plywood would prevent vagrants from living there, but its unsightly. Is there anything the Historical Society can do to improve this situation?

Town of Oakville Response:

The silo is listed on the Oakville Heritage Register, but that only gives us 60 days' notice of an intention to demolish. We don't require heritage permits to changes to the silo and don't have any grounds to request changes to the unsightly plywood. I'll pass along the concerns about the open electrical box to our by-law department to see if they can check into it.
