Awards



Ross Wark was honoured to accept the Special Recognition Award on behalf of TTHS at the 15th Annual Heritage Awards in Mississauga. Here is what they said about us! "With urban development currently underway in North Oakville, TTHS stepped into the void to provide a voice in support of heritage. In the process, they have found a home for their meetings and growing collection in the Old Palermo Schoolhouse, successfully received a Trillium Grant for the restoration of the schoolhouse, and are in the process of developing a strong heritage program in the community – all driven by volunteers. TTHS has also fostered and developed strong relationships with likeminded groups and organizations in the surrounding area, and are becoming an informational resource in respect to local history and heritage. Given that Mississauga shares a border, and through amalgamation has even expanded over the years into what was once part of Trafalgar Township, Heritage Mississauga has begun to rely upon the resources and knowledge available through TTHS. TTHS has been innovative in respect to a heritage image scanning project in partnership, initially, with the Oakville Central Library, and in developing a comprehensive and informative website and e-newsletter, and embracing new technologies and methods of communication. The Trafalgar Township Historical Society is most worthy of this Special Recognition Award.

Fred Oliver

On Saturday, February 5, 2011 at the Oakville Trafalgar Memorial Hospital, in his 88th year we are sad to say, we said goodbye to a man who was part of Trafalgar Township's history. In 1948, Fred was appointed the Police Chief of Trafalgar Township and when Trafalgar and Oakville amalgamated in 1962 he became Chief of Police in Oakville. In 1954 he founded TOWARF, originally called Trafalgar & Oakville Water Air Rescue Force (now called Town of Oakville...) Fred was Past President, and served as President of the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police and on several committees of the International Police Chiefs Association, in addition to the many other clubs and boards that he served on. Fred also served as Town and Regional Councillor for over 28 years, having served the community in two capacities for over 55 years. He will be missed! Orange Lawrence made a surprise visit at our April speakers event. The statue in the picture is a model of the larger than life statue that now sits in the centre of Broadway Avenue in Orangeville that was unveiled in 2007. Aletha Lawrence Kirkwood (on the left) is a great, great grand-daughter of Orange Lawrence who was born in Connecticut and lived in Trafalgar Township from about 1823 to 1844 before removing to Orangeville. He left the farm to his son Ferris Lawrence and the farm remained in the Lawrence family until 1977. Russell Lawrence, a son of Ferris, had a farm on the 3rd line and he and a number of his descendants are buried across the road in Palermo cemetery

41 Dundas Street

Does anyone have early photos or information on this house or its owners? This area is getting ready for development and we are looking for details on the home so that we can save it from demolition and have it incorporated into the new development. The land was first owned by John Robinson and then from 1825 to 1862 belonged to the Munn's family. It appears that the frame portion of the house was built during this time.

Trafalgar 1 NDS lot 15 (this house lot)

Nov 1807 John Robinson

Jan 1825 Millicent Munn widow (from executors of John Robinson)

1841- 1862, 1851 Census Jordan Munn, frame 1 ½ storey with wife & 5 children - listed next to George Elliott

1861 Census Jordan Munn, frame 1 storey home with wife & 9 children

1871 Census Markland Hastings – lived there from Nov 62 to Apr 73 (john on land registry)

1873-1874 Land Registry George Awde born in Ontario 8 June 1850 was a farmer. Lived in Walpole Haldimand County. Oct 1872 married Sarah Secord in Haldimand Co. Moved to Michigan by 1880.

1874- 1881 Land Registry William Perkins b. 1848 England m. Phebe Cutting 1888

1881 Land registry Joseph Orr b. 1830 was in Trafalgar 1851 & in 1861 in a frame 1 ½, a farmer but in 1871 & 1881 was in Peel.

1881 Census Andrew Bates age 32, b. On, farmer

1883-1890 Charles Henry Schooley b. circa 1859 Oxford On, living Yorkville in 1880, an oil refiner married Samantha Hammond b. Bronte

1890-1919 Land Registry James Alfred Stephens b. 1864, m. Emma Kindree in Trafalgar Dec 1886, d. July 29 1926 buried Munn's, retired farmer. 1901 Trafalgar census he is a Milk dealer.

O'Reilly's

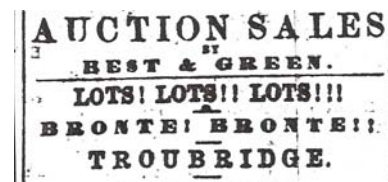
